WORKSHOPPED EXHIBITION

A short but lively 'Workshopped' exhibition was held in January. Pieces on display were from AST members who have participated in workshops anywhere during the last two years. Not all works were for sale, with the exhibition intending to give the viewer an understanding of the topics and techniques covered in the myriad of workshops that are available to both here in Tasmania and further afield.

Tutors such as Eve Howard, Stefano Flonta, June Francis, Lyn Brown, Gina Elphinstone, Gerry Jensen, Leoni Duff, Lindy Whitton, Felicity Lovett, Mahdi Chandler, Tony White, John Lovett, Gina Haywood, Carol Sheppard, Atelier Canova (Rome), Carolyn Audet, Diane Casimaty and Susan Meech, all left lasting impressions on the artists' work on display.

BEHIND THE HEROES-CHRIS ARNOL

The gallery was packed for Chris's poignant exhibition "Behind The Heroes", which was opened by Anna Reynolds, Lord Mayor of Hobart on the 8th February. Chris's works are on display until the 1st March and well worth a visit as the pieces accurately capture the despair and anguish of what he and his work colleagues have experienced over the many years of fighting fires. To quote Chris, "My idea is to put you in their shoes in those moments, often unseen by the general public ... so when you look at my work try to imagine what is in the mind of the firefighter you are viewing". An unspoken sentiment of the real heroes to whom we are truly indebted.



Along with the extremity of fire, the exhibition also displays some sensitive pastel portraiture pieces, again with Chris expertly encapsulating the exact mood of the moment.

At the opening Elaine Lincolne asked Chris to talk about his journey thus far. Here is just a small excerpt from his speech: "I knew I could draw at age 7. At primary school when we did projects I became preoccupied with doing great drawings and illustrations of the subject but did absolutely no study into the subject to the annoyance of my teachers. In those formative years I used to copy cartoons off the TV, sit in the lounge for hours copying Eric Joliffe's Saltbush Bill, antics of his Witchety tribe & Australiana cartoons.....also Ken Maynards- Ned and his Neddy. I won the art award in Parklands High School, did Art at Hellyer college – retained my passion for art ever since...As a young man I was inspired by Dutch artist M.C.Escher, the famous Spanish Surrealist Salvador Dali, love the Baroque old masters, John Singer Sargent so you will see in my works – strong dose of figurative realism while playing with optics at times to create 'realism with a twist."

MEMBER PROFILE—CAROLYN BASSETT



Carolyn Bassett is another Life Member who has dedicated many years of voluntary service to the Art Society of Tasmania. Carolyn joined the AST in 1984 where she and her husband Ron became Committee Members. In 2009, after many years volunteering in various positions and publishing the AST newsletter, Carolyn became President.

Carolyn said she considers her art practice just one of

the many hobbies she enjoys, along with gardening, reading, desktop publishing and serving on many committees in and around her hometown of Kempton. Her interest in art has always been with her since a young girl and getting pleasure from drawing and painting at school and in her family home.



Carolyn enjoys her garden and has a wonderful eclectic mix of her pieces integrated in her garden such as this Hebel sculpture and intriguing Terracotta mask pictured above.

Later in life Carolyn attended many Adult Education classes and practiced her love of art as a watercolourist, tutored by Max Thalman. Carolyn said she found Max to be very inspiring.

Ernest Foxcroft was another Tasmanian watercolourist and Adult Education tutor from whom Carolyn drew inspiration from, studying the form of buildings and boats. Carolyn can remember Ernest's words of wisdom to his students," **Make sure everything is accurate and in proportion—make sure the structure is correct**".

Terrence Gough is another source of inspiration and even though she was still practicing her watercolour techniques with Terrence, it was around this time she decided to change to using acrylic paint as a new medium, stating she was able to obtain stronger colourants and use the medium in different ways that watercolour could not provide. Carolyn can remember a brilliant one liner quoted by Terrence at the time- "**Don't be afraid to experiment**", which she did and moved on experimenting, practising and utilising acrylic paints.

Over the years Carolyn said inspiration has come in many forms but really, it's the wonderful one liners which are remembered the most. Words such as" **Make every line count"**, quoted from past Life Member, Nell Francombe has always been kept in mind and considered.

Carolyn said her style in painting has changed over the years, stating she has become much looser and not as tight in her mark making and now tries a variety of subjects to paint. "Letting myself go and using big brushes is more my style these days". Two artist tools that Carolyn cannot be without in her studio are her palette knife and her trusty old well used wide brush.



Listening to classical music is a little thing that can make Carolyn's day better and also plays a central role whilst she is painting. "Depending on the type of music played, it can create the mood to which I paint by. Music is a wonderful instrument that is very emotive, at times

bringing tears but just like sunny days music can bring about happiness and good feelings". When I asked Carolyn what she considers to be the

most fulfilling accomplishment so far as an artist she



said that it was an honour and very special time in her life to be awarded AST Life Membership. "It's good to be appreciated and recognised for all the hard work over the years. Being a contributing member of the AST is a positive and rewarding thing. If you put in, you will always get something out of it. Both Ron and I supported the AST well by attending all the exhibition openings, events, social outings and workshops and had fun doing so".



Another recent accomplishment for Carolyn is taking on an instrumental part in developing and planning the Kempton Town Mural. Carolyn is a member of the community group Lower Midlands Arts who have been influential with a wonderful mural in the main street of Kempton which depicts the local landscape of times gone by. Stage 1 of the community project has now been completed which includes *Kempton and Bagdad Primary School children who decorated terracotta leaves and other items for the mural. Along with*

Carolyn, two other AST members, Maggie Nettleship and Lynn Hasenkam

also gave their time painting the mural. Carolyn has now established Stage 2 of the plans for the extension of the landscape with the project now ready to be undertaken with the same community interest and involvement.



When asked if she had any words of wisdom to pass onto new members, Carolyn said "Always listen to any critique about your work. For example, if your work is not accepted in the Annual Exhibition, read and take on board your letter of critique and learn from it. Another drop of wisdom which is remembered from a Max Angus assertion is, if you produce quality work then ensure you have quality framing to compliment the palette".

BEHIND THE ARTIST- ROGER IMMS

I AM AN ARTIST!

You should be proud of being an artist. It's a vital part of your place in the world. Because this is who you are, it's what people know you to be. It gives you some of the most elevated moments in your life yet drives you to distraction. It's a compulsion, It fuels you and drives you.

These principles have stood me in good stead over the past 15 years as I've referred back to them time after time. I don't know how often I've re-written them into my daily journal;

INNER CERTAINTY, DRIVENNESS , TANGIBLE PROGRESS AND SUPPORT.

In this series of short articles I will be exploring what it means to be an artist, what keeps us going, the difficulties we face and also the moments of joy. **Inner Certainty** is not confidence or bravado. It is firm self-belief. Most artists - even the famous - have periods of crippling self-doubt. Yet in those times, when you have zero confidence, you can still know inside that the heap of rubbish sitting on the easel in front of you (as you see it) is teaching you something and that it holds the glimmer of the unique piece of art that the world will see one day.

Art shifts people. A piece of art can alter a person's perceptions and help them see the world in a different way. What a privilege to be able to do this. What a great feeling it is when someone GETS IT; the thing you were trying to do in a painting comes across to them. What greater feeling than when someone says to you "That painting really spoke to me". I recently hung a very large work in a public space and it was such a joy to see how the painting stopped people in their tracks. They engaged fully with the image and two different people saw me there and with wet eyes said " I don't know how to express it but this really affects me......" THAT'S why I am an artist. Not for acclaim or sales but to take a flat piece of canvas or paper, or a blob of clay and make something plastic that guides someone into another way of looking at themselves or the world. For me it's a quiet burning inside, a feeling of rightness about that illusive image in your head that you want to bring to the world – the one you *know* you can do, almost a sense of mission. Yes, you are unique, you have something to say that only you can say.

Alfred Camus said, in 1842;

'Being an artist is nothing but the long journey through the detours of art in order to bring to the world that one great image that first took seed in your heart'

James Gleeson put it this way in his poem 'On Starting a Painting' 'Dispersed on the pallette the ointments of light await And the whiteness aches for the unction of a loaded brush

A latent image waits transmission by the acting hand Something will be that had not been before'

Be proud of what you are. You are an artist! ROGER IMMS
